## **COGSO President's Message**

Here we are at the end of term 3, it has been an incredibly busy few months.

#### **ELECTION**

We gathered all of the feedback you have given us and provided it to Territory politicians and candidates, in the form of 46 questions, to see where they stand on your public education issues. We then ran a very well attended Q&A forum in August, attended by the then Minister for Education and the then Shadow Minister asking them your 46 questions.

The NT Council of Government School Organisations (COGSO) is not a political body, however parents asked us to step up during the 2016 Election campaign on behalf of the public education system, which we did, with great results.

We now have a Territory government that has listened to schools and families and has committed to an increase of \$124M over the next 4 years to our children's education. Whilst this is a very good start to giving back to our children that which was taken, we believe the audit and assessment of Global School Budget funding that our new government has committed to, will show government that further financial commitment is required.

COGSO represents 18,000 Northern Territory families and their 33,500 children in 151 public schools. Parents are passionate about their child's education and expect our children's public education system properly resourced.

#### WHAT TO DO IF YOU ARE BEING BULLIED

You have a right to feel safe and be safe. If you are being bullied here are some ideas about what you can do.

**Talk to someone about it.** Find a trusted friend, teacher or carer who will listen to how you feel, be supportive, and perhaps even help you work out what to do.

- Talk to your friends they can help you tell a teacher or your parents or just to feel better.
- Talk to your parents tell them all about what's been happening.
- Talk to your teacher or another staff member tell them all about what's been happening. If you don't want to do this in public, make an excuse to see the teacher about something else, for example your homework.
- If you can't talk to someone face-to-face go online at Kids Helpline <u>www.kidshelp.com.au</u> or call a Kids Helpline counsellor on 1800 55 1800.

Try a few of the strategies that have worked for others. Only try these strategies if you are not in any immediate danger of being physically hurt and you feel confident you can do them.

- Ignore the bullying turn your back and walk away.
- Act unimpressed or pretend you don't care what they say or do to you. You could say 'okay, whatever' and walk away.
- Use strong, assertive statements, starting with the word 'I'; tell the other person 'I want you to stop that' in a strong confident voice. Practice this with your friends.
- Use 'fogging' which means making a joking or funny comment that makes the other person think you don't care about what they say.
- Ask your friends to speak up for you. And remember to do the same for them!

Try to stay positive. Focus on all the things that you do well, the people who like you and care about you. Write down your thoughts and feelings about the bullying to help you think clearly about what you can do.

Hang around with your friends and be with people who help you feel good about yourself. Good friends respect, encourage and support you. They care for your wellbeing and are fun to be around. You'll make new friends by respecting, encouraging and supporting others.

Try to sort out the problem behind the bullying. If you feel safe to do so, talk with the other people involved and ask them how you might be able to sort out the problem together.

## **Special Education and Disability Support Services...**

Students with a disability in the NT have a right to access a full and inclusive curriculum that meets individual needs.

The Department of Education provides services to all students in NT government schools, and provides assistance in some areas to non-government schools.

If your child has a disability you can access support services including specialist education advisors, specialised equipment and resources.

The range of support services available cover all of the following:

#### **SUPPORT SERVICES**

If your child has a disability you can access support services including specialist education advisors, specialised equipment and resources.

The range of support services available cover all of the following:

- autism spectrum disorder (ASD)
- counselling
- disability
- · early childhood intervention
- hearing
- psychology
- transition from school
- vision

#### **SPECIALIST EDUCATION SETTINGS**

Your child may be accommodated in:

- · a mainstream school
- a specialist program e.g. hearing units and Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) programs
- · a specialist centre attached to a mainstream school
- a specialist school

#### **AUTISM SPECTRUM DISORDER (ASD)**

Support is available at the school if your child has autism spectrum disorder (ASD) or social communication disorder (SCD).

ASD advisors can assist in developing support strategies for your child to maximise their educational outcomes.

#### **EARLY CHILDHOOD INTERVENTION**

ECI advisors provide planned provision of specialist services to support you and your child to maximise their development and learning.

#### How to get support

You can refer your child directly to the service, or your child's doctor, teacher, therapists, community health professionals or child care provider can refer your child with your consent.

You will be asked to sign the parent consent authority.

Hearing team advisors can assist if your child has a hearing impairment to allow your child access to the curriculum on the same basis as other students.

Support is offered from birth, or as soon as your child is identified as having a hearing impairment and continues through preschool, primary and secondary school.

Hearing team advisors can assist in developing support strategies for your child at school.

Support can be provided face to face and/or through video conferencing technology throughout the NT and to both government and non-government schools.

The level of support your child will receive will depend on the degree and type of hearing loss and the level of need.

#### How to get support

If your child has a permanent sensorineural and/or conductive hearing loss you can access support from hearing team advisors.

#### TRANSITION FROM SCHOOL

#### **VISION**

Support is available at the school if your child has a vision loss or impairment.

Vision team advisors can assist if your child has a significant vision impairment to allow your child access to the curriculum on the same basis as other students.

Support is offered from birth, or as soon as your child is identified as having a vision impairment and continues through preschool, primary and secondary school.

The level of support will depend on your child's needs.

The vision resource centre is located at Sanderson Middle School and advisors deliver services across the Territory.

#### How to get support

Your child is eligible for support from the vision resource centre if they are blind or their corrected distance vision is worse than 6/18 and/or they have a visual field reduction to less than 20 degrees, or their near vision requires significant support for the production of alternate format materials..



## A message from the Chief Executive, Department of Education

In addition to the work and dedication of our teachers and support staff in schools, school councils and boards play an important role in continuing to drive improvement in our system and increase student results. Every parent who is actively involved in their school, particularly those who are part of a school council or board, make an important and valuable contribution to framing the future of education in the Territory. I am very pleased with how school councils and boards, with the support of NT COGSO, are continuing to drive the change agenda to benefit student outcomes.

With this in mind, schools are looking ahead to 2017 with additional government support for school global budgets, and starting to prepare for what is anticipated to be another year of growth and continued improvement.

In August 2016, the preliminary NAPLAN report was released and I was very pleased to see the improvement in the Northern Territory results. They demonstrate significant advances in numeracy and literacy, particularly writing. Compared to the 2015 results, there has been a marked increase in the number of students in years 3, 5, 7 and 9 who are exceeding the national minimum standards for writing. Year 5 students have made significant gains across the test domains of writing, numeracy, and grammar and punctuation. There have been improvements in 16 of 20 test domains, and I am pleased that a much higher proportion of students

participated in NAPLAN this year. Schools and teachers, in both the government and non-government schooling system, have worked hard to achieve these outcomes with their students, and I applaud their commitment. There is still a long way to go, but I believe we can build on these gains, increasing students' proficiency in skills that are the key to building a successful future. Individual student reports were sent out to parents and guardians in August, and the full NAPLAN report for the Territory will be available in December. The report will allow us to disaggregate results by region, school, and indigeneity.

Early data is indicating an increase in the number of NTCET Year 12 student completions in 2016, as against 2015. This is great news, and the early data also shows that we also have projected increases in the number of Indigenous Year 12 completers. Ensuring every student who is on track to complete, can complete, and does so, is of paramount

importance over the coming months. I know all our secondary schools, and schools running secondary programs in remote locations, are working hard in this regard.

### **Access to Public Dental Services**

Oral Health Services NT encourages all Territorians to take the first step on the road to good oral health by following the five key oral health messages of "stay, play, brush, eat and drink well". These messages focus on encouraging regular dental check-ups, wearing mouth guards when playing contact sports, twice daily brushing, eating healthy food and drinking lots of water.

All Territorian families can access dental services by either contacting their private



dentist or for eligible clients, the public dental service at Oral Health Services NT. Children of families receiving the Family Tax Benefit are also eligible to access the \$1000 of dental treatment available through the Child Dental Benefit Scheme. This can be done either through the family's private dentist or through the Public Dental service.

In the Northern Territory, families with children from birth to 18 years who attend secondary school, can access public dental services by phoning 8922 6466 (Top End) and 8951 6713 (Central Australia).

## **New Territory government - education commitments**

COGSO Q&A 13 August 2016

Will your party commit to immediate action on a true student needs based model and funding required for all NT students in public education?

"We think there needs to be more work done on the model of global school budgets particularly looking at the loading around the formulas so that will be something that we will be having a look at because we believe it needs to be looked at and a good responsible government should look at that." (Nicole Manison, previous Shadow Minister Education - current NT Treasurer)

The new government has promised to re-invest in education to ensure the best possible future for our children.

- In 2016 every school will get \$300,000 for repairs, upgrades and infrastructure
- An additional \$124 million over 4 years
  - 1 January 2017 \$20m of the \$124m will go directly into School Budgets
  - 1 January 2017 \$8m of the \$124m to support students with a disability and/or challenging needs
  - 1 January 2017 \$1m for Business Managers
- Ongoing funding will be based on attendance + 10%
