COGSO PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Hello Everyone,

I hope you and your children have had a great term three and are celebrating your child's achievements and successes during the term.

The Department of Education have been holding consultation sessions, listening to what school communities have to say in order to develop their school and student centred strategic plan. If you missed the scheduled forums, you may still have input by visiting the department's website or our NTCOGSO Facebook page and filling in the survey. http://survey.nousgroup.com.au/s3/NT-Education-Vision Your input is valuable!

Through lobbying Federal Senators and cross benches, the combined efforts of NT COGSO, the Honourable Eva Lawler, Minister for Education, the NT Department of Education and the NT Australian Education Union, we have succeeded in gaining "top up" funds of approximately \$78M from the Federal Government. This lobbying was crucial after the Federal Government cut the NT student resource standard from

24% to 20% in Australian Education Amendment Bill 2017.

Whilst we can celebrate this success, it does not provide any certainty going beyond the next couple of years. Rest assured NT COGSO will continue to advocate for our children and request real, needs based funding from the Federal Government, not just rhetoric.

The Nationally Consistent Collection of Data (NCCD) on school students with disability collects information about students with disability across Australia in a consistent way. It counts the number of school students with disability receiving educational adjustments to allow them to participate in education on the same basis as students without a disability.

The data goes to the national collection Agency and the Australian Government Department of Education and Training. Some cases will involve the school passing the data directly to the department and in other cases the school will provide the data to the NT government agency or other relevant

body, depending on the school's arrangements. The information will not identify individual students. This data is crucial in determining allocation of Federal funds.

After considerable feedback from school communities NT COGSO are meeting with key stakeholders to ensure our schools resume access to Youth Engagement Police Officers (YEPO). YEPO's are a valuable resource to NT schools and the wider NT community, they provide positive, proactive police resources to school communities. Regular, effective communication will assist crime prevention and behavioural issues through positive interaction between students, parents, school staff and YEPO's.

MANYALLALUK STUDENTS GET THE **ROYAL TREATMENT**




Manyallaluk School, a remote school 100 km north-east of Katherine, is using the strategy of writing letters as one way to engage students in literacy through creating authentic writing experiences.

Queen Elizabeth and Essendon Football Club megastars have been recipients of letters from junior and senior primary students at Manyallaluk School.

To the delight of students, they have received responses from both Mary Robinson, Lady-in-Waiting to Queen Elizabeth and the Essendon Football Club.

Minister for Education Eva Lawler was thrilled with the students' commitment to writing and the responses they received.





"This is one of those stories that simply brings a smile to your face," Ms Lawler said.

"The students will remember this moment for the rest of their lives and I commend the teachers, staff and students for their great initiative.

"To see such wonderful things happen in our remote schools is fantastic and I can't wait to hear about the future letters they write – and the responses they receive!"

Teaching Principal of Manyallaluk School, Ben Kleinig said that through this activity, students have been gaining confidence in their writing skills.

"We slowly introduced letter writing last term, and then realised its potential," he said.

"The kids chose their favourite football players, and The Queen — someone who is pretty popular with our students.

"Making the writing experience authentic with an audience beyond just the teacher and reaching a global audience gets our students excited about writing.

"Enthusiasm and excitement about writing translates into more effort, self-belief, having-a-go and more time put into writing by the kids.

"Getting a "real-world" reply is its own reward and the kids love it. Imagine big smiles and lots of jumping for joy when one of these replies arrives in the mail! "One substantial improvement is our students gaining the confidence to move away from relying on the teacher, being brave enough to have a go at sounding-out and then being open to feedback."

In her letter to The Queen, Year 2 student, Alice wrote: 'Dear Queen Elizabeth. Did you have a birthday cake? Old Mary was sitting down

drinking a cup of tea watching the dogs chase a buffalo. But don't worry, she can run fast. From Alice.'



So will this education strategy be continued into the future by the school?

"Yes! The opportunities are limitless and the results so far are very exciting," Mr Kleinig said.



A MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE, DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

This term, a key focus for our department is ensuring that Territorians have a strong voice in our future strategic direction.
